Annual Report to the First Selectman:

I am pleased to present you with the Redding Police Department's FY 20/21 Annual Report. The Annual Report is intended to provide you with information on the police department's activities for the fiscal year. I am happy to inform you that Redding continues to be a safe and vibrant community. I hope you find the report informative.

The COVID pandemic presented a tremendous challenge to our nation, state, and community. Our law enforcement operations were not immune. Court, DMV, and forensic laboratories were closed or limited in operations at various stages thought the fiscal year. With stay-at-home orders in place, our roadways saw less traffic volume. We were forced to reconsider fundamental operational activities in order to protect the health of our personnel and the citizens of our community. Additionally, employee absences and staffing shortages negatively impacted our operating budget. However, there was some good news too. We completed a lengthy policy revision project with the Daigle Law Group that brings our agency to the highest industry standards and we welcomed Officer Brandon Lopiano as the newest member of the Redding Police Department! With all this said, the data reported should be compared with pre-pandemic years with the understanding of the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on our operations.

The Redding Police Department:

The Redding Police Department is located at 96 Hill Road and is open 24 hours a day, every day of the year. Chief Mark O'Donnell has been leading the department since October 2017. Chief O'Donnell has overall responsibility for the patrol, communications, and support service divisions of the department. Chief O'Donnell is assisted with a support staff of five. The police department's authorized sworn strength is sixteen police officers: Chief of Police, Captain, 4 Sergeants, 8 Patrol Officers, Detective and a School Resource Officer. The Police Department additionally has a full-time Animal Control Officer, 5 full-time Dispatchers and two part-time School Safety Officers. Redding Police Officers are certified Emergency Medical Responders. Our officers are trained to deliver Naloxone and all patrol cars are equipped with medical supplies, including oxygen and automatic external defibrillators.

Communication Center:

All 9-1-1 calls and routine calls are routed through the Redding Police Department's communication center. The communication center is staffed 24/7 by a single dispatcher. The police department dispatchers are state certified and are responsible for dispatching all police, EMS, and fire calls. Dispatchers are trained in: 911 Call-taking, Emergency Medical Dispatching, NCIC/COLLECT, and The Office of Statewide Emergency Telecommunications Dispatch Protocols.

Animal Control:

The Redding Animal Control Officer (ACO) serves the public by investigating all domestic animal and wildlife concerns. The Redding ACO is a trained Nuisance Wildlife Control Operator and is available to assist residents with wildlife matters.

School Safety:

We take our responsibility to safeguard all of our children while at school very seriously. All of our schools are monitored via video by police dispatch 24 hours per day. Our school safety team currently consists of:

- One full-time School Resource Officer (SRO) at Joel Barlow High School
- Two part-time armed School Safety Officers (SSO) at each of our two lowers schools.

Investigative Services:

The Redding Police Department's Detective supports the officers of the Patrol Division with complex and time-consuming criminal investigations for a wide assortment of offenses. Detective Dias has extensive training in cybercrime and fraud investigations. She is a premier investigator in this field and regularly assists many of our local, state and federal law enforcement partners with these complex investigations.

Services and Programs:

Selective Enforcement/Speeding Complaints:

The department uses several methods to address speeding complaints including the evaluation & study of the complaint and education through speed monitoring signs, data collection and enforcement. Residents are encouraged to report a particular speeding problem to the police department. Speeding Complaint forms are available on-line at www.rpdct.us.

Police Internships:

The Redding Police Department offers an educational work experience through an internship program. The internship program allows high school and college students an opportunity to personally evaluate the profession of law enforcement.

Car Seat Safety Checks and Installations:

Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians will demonstrate and explain to caregivers about the proper selection, installation and use of car seats, booster seats and proper use of seatbelts. Please contact Sergeant Quinn to schedule an appointment for an installation.

Emergency Notifications:

The Redding Police Department tries to get important information to residents as soon as possible. Several emergency notification systems are operational within the Town of Redding providing varying degrees of information for those who want it. Visit our website to learn more.

Fingerprinting Services:

The Redding Police Department will fingerprint any resident, Town of Redding Employee or prospective employee or other person who is required to be fingerprinted for employment, who works or resides in the Town of Redding. Call the communications center to schedule an appointment.

Redding Parking Authority:

West Redding Railroad Parking Permits are available at the police department. Permits are issued for the calendar year at a cost of \$250.

Med Drop

The RPD Medication Disposal Program provides 24/7 access to the public in disposing of their unused or unwanted medications. A secure drug disposal bin is located in the front lobby of the Police Department. Community Outreach:
